Wild Dunedin Festival 19 – 28 April 2024

This year's 9th *Wild Dunedin Festival* in the April school holidays has a record number of fantastic events and activities on Otago Peninsula for all ages and interests.

Children can see a magic show on Port to Port's Sootychaser, go on a treasure hunt at Quarantine Island, experience the Marine Studies Centre's touch tanks at the Wild Fun Day at Portobello and learn about native plants at Larnach Castle, with free entry.

The Marine Studies Centre at Portobello has a range of fascinating activities for all ages exploring the coastal marine environment including looking at coastal wonders with VR headsets.

Wild Fun at Portobello on 24 April builds on the success of this event in 2023 with a focus on conservation and sustainability with contributions from community groups.

Gardeners can take a tour of Hereweka Garden, learn about gardening for climate change with Fiona Eadie at Larnach Castle, go to a workshop at Macandrew Bay on permaculture or organic greenhouse gardening, and go on a bus tour of peninsula gardens – Peninsula People, Plants and Pets.

Foodies can do some wild dining at Glenfalloch, and for those who love to dress up, there's a Wild Night Masquerade at Larnach Castle in aid of yellow eyed penguins.

Fancy a yoga session on a Portobello hilltop? There will be two opportunities to do this.

We are thrilled to announce that The OPERA (formerly Penguin Place) is supporting Wild Dunedin as a Platinum sponsor. The Otago Peninsula Eco Restoration Alliance is dedicated to the conservation of Otago Peninsula's native flora and fauna. They are developing a 50-year planting plan that will see the full restoration of all areas on the property being transitioned to native forest.

The OPERA will be running wildlife photography tours, and also offering deals, along with the Royal Albatross Centre, Blue Penguins Pukekura, Monarch Wildlife Cruises, and Clearwater Wildlife Tours.

These are the Otago Peninsula highlights of the Wild Dunedin Festival. There are many more fantastic opportunities to do crafts, see wildlife and Suzy Cato, learn about bees, compost, sustainable gardening, weather, sea lions, frogs and albatross, go foraging, tramping, indoor climbing and diving in a kelp forest. Many of these activities are free.

The Festival programme will be available from Friday 15 March. Visit our stall at the South Dunedin Street Festival on Saturday 16 March where there will be free face painting and we'll be handing out programmes. Port To Port has had an exciting few months, with the cycleway being completed and open since August 2023 and cyclists making the most of Cycling The Loop, on Otago Harbour.

(See website <u>www.dunedincycleway.co.nz</u> for ideas on things to do along the way.)

It takes approx 2 hours to cycle all the way around, without any stops. A good amount of time to allow is approx 3 hours, including a coffee stop and the ferry trip across the harbour, which is approx 10 minutes.

On the boat the skipper loads the bikes for you and gives a full and professional commentary along the way. There are many locals trying it out on electric and manual bikes.

The boat can take up to 15 bikes at a time. It has become a favourite for work groups to get together to 'cycle the loop' and stop at restaurants along the way. Give it a go, while the weather is still warm!

\$35 per person, with a bike, to cross on the ferry, or buy a local's concession card (For yourself or somebody else!). Buy four crossings and you will get an extra one for free.

What has SWAT been up to lately? From mid November to early February our prime target is Chilean flame creeper (CFC). We initially check out known CFC sites to deal to young vines before they climb high into the canopy and flower, then search for new infestations. Some of the sites are in dense native bush, full of tall tree ferns and ancient broadleaf trees, very beautiful but not that easy to get around. We are very fortunate to have access to a drone, thanks to the generosity of a local film maker. The

drone camera provides an 8 minute movie of the bush canopy and any red CFC flowers are very obvious. Thanks to these drone flights, we are confident that no new CFC vines have flowered in the native bush we surveyed over the past 3 years.

Our attention now shifts back to trying to stop the spread of Banana Passionfruit (BPF). In order to prevent the spread of pest plants it is important to stop the seeds getting from one place to another. A study undertaken by the School of Biological Sciences, University of Canterbury, indicated that one animal which is particularly good at transporting seeds of BPF is the possum, with the seeds found in possum poo having an excellent germination rate. For many years those pesky possums have been spreading BPF around the Peninsula. An introduced plant and an introduced animal have teamed up to their mutual advantage!



Now, with far fewer possums, the spread of BPF should slow down. However, when a ripe fruit drops from the vine onto the ground those seeds will still germinate. So, if you have a BPF vine on your section that is difficult to kill, then removing the fruit and disposing of them with your rubbish (not your compost) is well worth doing.

Remember, if you would like advice or help controlling pest plants on your property, or find a plant that you think could be a problem weed we would be keen to hear from you.

In 2014 they moved to New Zealand. I am always so impressed by people who can speak and write in two languages especially when they are so very different. English can be such a confusing language. I remember talking to an Italian geologist who was waiting for his wife to join him and I said, "Do you miss your wife?" he looked horrified and said "I do not hit my wife." That made me realise how difficult it must be to learn, understand and communicate in English. Huaran communicates well. He is a very positive person with a great sense of humour.

Huaran grew up in the country in Shandong Province on the northern coast of China. His mother is still there and can't travel so it is important for the Li family to go back every few years to visit, if possible. Huaran and Chengai live in Andersons Bay. They have three daughters. Fangy who is 11 and at Intermediate school, Jiayi, 6 and Shuyi 4. The children speak both English and Chinese. On Sundays, the family attend a Chinese culture group at the Chinese gardens where they are taught to read and write in Chinese. Embracing the traditions of their heritage and participating in cultural activities that enrich our community is important to the Li family. Celebrating the Chinese New Year is a joyous occasion and Fangy, who loves dancing and singing, was part of the performance this year. Chengai and Huaran share both the shop and home duties so life is very busy.

Huaran, a skilled chef with two decades of experience, has some great ideas for expanding food choices but is very limited by the small kitchen available to him at this time. He really wants to offer a diverse selection of quality foods at reasonable prices. Huaran has been horrified at the prices he has to pay to wholesalers. For the first few weeks it kept him awake at nights trying to think of how he could cut the prices down for his customers. This is really important to him and he is doing the very best he can. It is almost impossible to compete with the big supermarkets. Everything seems to have escalated in price. He shops around for the best deals and would welcome any ideas or fresh food from locals that he could sell at a reasonable price. Kimi is the other person you will meet each day. She is the shop manager and has a wonderful smile and a bubbly personality. Kimi left Indonesia ten years ago. After completing school, she studied Hospitality management in Tauranga. She always wanted to live in the South Island and after a good look around, chose Dunedin.

Kimi has two jobs. She works from 4.00am until 1.00pm in PAK'nSave then catches the bus to Macandrew bay and works here from 3.00 – 6.00pm but she absolutely loves it.

We have been making the most of the good weather and getting outside for lots of fun learning including gardening, games, picking plums, and making good use of our school pool. We are also very excited to launch our new design thinking model Tūhura/Discover in 2024. The staff and tamariki were really fortunate to work with lain Cook- Bonney from Learning Architects as part of our Professional Learning Development This is focused around increasing our Digital Fluency Skills and enhancing our localised curriculum. 

Tena Koutou everyone

Well, it's a new year and I ponder what it will bring. I hope you all had a good break and are refreshed as we head into 2024.

The children are all back at school and Kindy (Yes, I can hear you all saying "yay") so a reminder to drivers to please take care at drop off and pick up times around our Kura. Our little ones are unpredictable around roads.

I recovered a stolen vehicle a few weeks ago out at Hoopers Inlet. Unfortunately, there are a lot of vehicles being taken at the moment in and around Dunedin so please ensure you keep yours locked and don't leave any important/valuable items in view. Don't be complacent. The go to vehicles are Demio's, Tiida's and Aquas for the most part, but anything is game for these people.

Still getting reports of poor driving (only been receiving them for the nearly 6 years I've been here) and again have witnessed some myself when travelling to and from Dunedin. It's about time these people took a long hard look in the mirror. I am quite frankly sick and tired of poor decision making when it comes to our roads. It's only a matter of time before something goes horribly wrong and I'm not looking forward to that. Please slow down and be patient. I make no apologies if you end up on the receiving end of an infringement notice.

If you're going out possum or rabbit shooting (day or night), could I ask that you either give me a call to advise or ring 105 to log it. I had a job a couple of weeks ago where multiple gunshots were heard during the day, and someone called it in. It turns out it was someone legitimately shooting but given today's society, someone had concerns and rightly so. This just makes it a bit tidier, and I don't have to go into a situation not knowing what is happening. Many of you already do this and it is really appreciated.

A vehicle was broken into in Company Bay a week or so ago. These crims are random and take any opportunity they get, so a few good things to remember are to not leave valuables visible in the car and lock it at all times.

There has been a Burglary at a boatshed in Broad Bay. So a reminder to those of you who own them to make sure they are as secure as possibly and tasty items stored away out of sight, if able.

If you're travelling through Pukehiki please adhere to the posted speed limits. Some don't seem to understand what those big round red and white signs mean with the large number in the middle. Highest speed recorded by me up there in past couple of weeks is 72kmph in a 40 zone. This is not acceptable and, had it been a bit higher, this person would have lost their licence. Please respect the residents up there. This goes for all of our areas on the Peninsula.

If you are a victim of any type of crime, please ring and report it. I have recently been told of a couple of things that have happened that I was not made aware of. It is important because (a) you've been the victim of a crime and (b) there may be a bigger picture to it all. I do care and that is my job so please make a report by either contacting me or again ringing 105 if it is historic and you don't need immediate police assistance.

Our team is ramping

up our efforts as we try to close in on our ambitious goal of peninsula-wide possum eradication. The possum numbers are very low thanks to our team's efforts and all the hard work from our wonderful community of volunteers and supportive landowners. So far this year, we have only had one community catch between Challis and Taiaroa Head (see image below), which just so happened to be in Macandrew Bay. We know there are still some more wily possums lurking about the area and locating them continues to be a major focus since it's the first step in being able to target them. We're using a range of monitoring tools, but community reports are invaluable. So if you see a possum, hear a possum, or even find signs of a possum, like fresh scat or bite marks on tress, please get in touch. We think the males are on the move in search of a mate and we're seeing them in areas we previously thought were possum-free, so even if you haven't had possums in your backyard for ages, please KEEP SETTING YOUR TRAPS in case one comes wandering through.

As always, it's been wonderful working with our community to achieve eradication and continue to benefit from increased native birdlife and healthy native vegetation.

Housekeeping for 2024

- ⇒ Dispose of your lightbulbs at Mitre 10. Any traditional typical household bulbs, either Fluorescent or LED. This programme is not designed to manage commercial volumes of bulbs and is aimed at supporting residential customers. Any household bulb has the capacity to be recycled. Bring it into the store and they will recycle this for you via their partner Interwaste.
- ⇒ Cargill Enterprises e-Waste department offers you an opportunity to dispose of your electronic waste in an environmentally friendly and ethical way. Their no fuss drop off service is situated behind their office building at 199 Hillside Road, South Dunedin. Simply drive down the driveway off Hillside Road at the side of the building. Open between the hours of 8.30 and 4.30, Monday to Friday. Most batteries can also be taken there.
- \Rightarrow Hearing aid batteries are accepted at the supplier of your hearing aids.

- ⇒ Taste Nature is calling out to our Dunedin community to donate and drop off unused jars at their store, 131 High Street, Dunedin. Shop hours Mon—Fri 8am to 6pm, Sat 9am—4pm. They accept jars with lids, but without any labels, and in clean reusuable condition. They sterilise the jars and sell them to their customers for \$1 with any purchase of dry goods, all to support waste minimisation.
- ⇒ Presbyterian Support Otago's foodbank needs clean food containers to decant bulk supplies into smaller portions. Plastic and glass are suitable as long as they have lids, so save those jam jars and ice-cream, yoghurt, takeaway and margarine pottles, and drop them into PSO in Moray Place.
- ⇒ New Rules for Food Labelling standards designed to protect customers with severe allergies are now in force. Food packaged before February 24 can still be sold without new labels for the next two years or until expired.
