TIME TO CELEBRATE!

The last weekend of October will mark the end of a 10-year journey to restore the historic Pukehiki Community Church. The Pukehiki Church Trust will be celebrating this milestone with a public open

day on Saturday 28 October, and a celebratory service in the church at 2pm Sunday, followed by a community afternoon tea in the Pukehiki Hall, across the road.

On 2nd October 1867 Richard Irving called a meeting of local people to discuss building a church at Pukehiki. A week later local joiner Walter Riddell presented plans for the church, and on 5th November presented a tender to build the church for £209-10. Walter started building on 15th December, and working up to 20hrs/day, for 10 shillings/day, completed the church on 8th March 1868

The Pukehiki Church Trust, noting that the Pukehiki Church was built by Sandymount craftsman joiner, Walter Riddell, records that it is equally important in the church's history to recognise how the church was faithfully restored by another craftsman joiner, Stuart Robertson, also of Sandymount. In 2014 Stuart was asked to undertake some weatherboard repairs prior to the church being repainted. This work, however, revealed that the church was in a hitherto unknown perilous state of decay due to water ingress throughout. Urgent remediation was required - everywhere.

Restoration planning and fund raising then spanned the next six years. Throughout this time, Stuart, assisted by local builder Graeme Carr, and Tom Leckie, strove at every turn to preserve and replicate Walter's original craftmanship. A host of other contractors assisted along the way, always under Stuart's watchful eye. The church is now a sight to behold, both inside and out.



Endurance22 expedition

On 5 March last year the *Endurance22* expedition located the wreck of Sir Ernest Shackleton's famous vessel *Endurance* lying 3km down at the bottom of the Weddell Sea off Antarctica. The position was found to be fully consistent with published predictions given by myself and collaborators Lars Bergman and David Mearns having scrutinized the astronomical observations recorded in Captain Frank Worsley's log books and now housed in the Canterbury Museum in Christchurch. Worsley was born in 1872 in Akaroa and is best known for successfully navigating the 22½ foot *James Caird* across 1500 km of the treacherous South Atlantic Ocean from Elephant Island to South Georgia seeking rescue.

The position where *Endurance* sank on 21 November, 1915 is given in the log book as 68°39¢30²S 52°26¢30²W. A good navigator equipped with a sextant, chronometer, and the astronomical tables published in the *Nautical Almanac* can, under the best of conditions, fix their position to within roughly half a nautical mile (NM). Close inspection of the logs however revealed that Worsley had been unable to get a sight of the Sun until the day following the sinking. During the intervening period the wind had been blowing predominantly from the south causing the sea



ice, on which the expedition was camped, drift to steadily northward. The log entry is consistent with the expedition's position at noon on the following day and therefore was not where Endurance

sank but is effectively the location of the hole in the ice that it went through some 19 hours after the event. In addition, Worsley had made a simple arithmetic error in reducing his observations. These factors combined to suggest that the latitude of the wreck could be up to 5.5 NM south of the log position.

To find longitude an accurate chronometer is needed. These were mechanical devices that required their rates to be constantly monitored. During the Antarctic winter of 1915, while *Endurance* was ice-bound, Worsley had done this by timing lunar occultations in which a star is seen to wink out behind the dark limb of the Moon. We found however that the positions of Moon available to Worsley in the *Nautical Almanac* of the day were inaccurate by modern standards and hence his estimates of longitude required adjustment. Combined with other factors this lead to the prediction that wreck could lie to the east of the log position by between 0.9 and 3.5 NM.

The *Endurance22* expedition eventually released the position of the wreck as 68°44'21"S 52°19'47"W. This is 4.9NM south and 2.4NM east of the log position which is fully consistent with our predictions. 
Otago Peninsula Museum News

AGM - Thanks to those who came along to our Annual General Meeting recently. Our Committee has stayed the same but we have good support around us.

BOOK - *Otago Peninsula Then and Now* has been published and is available from the Museum for \$30. We had wonderful community support along to our weekend photographic exhibition on 26 and 27 August where the book was also available. Copies are available at the Portobello Shop.

Our Tuesday working bees continue to be very busy fixing and improving things. One project is to make the fence between the Barn and the paddock look tidier.

We do get some interesting visitors and one recently was a descendant of the Weller Family. Matthew Weller visited from the UK and the Weller Brothers, who became Whalers in Otago, were part of his family.



Joseph Weller (1766-1857) was one of the sons of William Weller (1728-1802), founder of the brewing dynasty, and Joseph, like his brothers John and William, initially became a brewer. However, he suffered from consumption (tuberculosis) and was advised to move to a warmer, coastal climate. Joseph married Mary Brooks in 1801 and his first 2 sons, Joseph Brooks Weller and George Weller were baptised in Amersham but by 1807 when his first (surviving) daughter, Mary Brooks Weller, was baptised, he was living in Folkestone. His brothers, John Weller (1760-1843) and William Weller (1763-1843) bought out his share of the brewery.

Joseph's ill health continued and he was advised to go on a long sea voyage. His two elder sons, Joseph Brooks and George, made separate reconnaissance trips to Australia in the 1820s and after returning to England seem to have persuaded the whole family to emigrate there. Joseph Brooks and Edward went first in 1829 and were followed in 1830 by brother George, with his new wife Eliza Barwise, his father and his wife and George's 2 surviving sisters. Joseph had sold his estates in the UK and he took his money to Australia in sacks containing 12,000 sovereigns. Since 1817, a gold sovereign has weighed 7.988 g so the sacks would have been just under 100 kg and in 2017 the money would be worth a little over £800,000. On arrival in New South Wales, part of the money was invested in land but part in setting up a shipping and whaling business in Sydney which became very successful. A year later, in 1831, the younger sons Joseph Brooks and Edward set off in their whaler the Lucy Ann for New Zealand to set up a whaling business near what later developed into the city of Dunedin. They landed at what became known as Weller's Rock and became very successful.

You can express manaakitanga by helping a friend or loved one. You can even help someone you've just met.

For our Roll Call each month - so far we have donated wool for Super Grans; used stamps for the Blind Foundation; monetary donation for Cyclone Gabrielle; and donations of canned and packaged food for the Food Bank. It is 3 years since a small group of Peninsula residents decided to spend our Friday mornings tackling pest plants.

A grant from the Otago Peninsula Community Board allowed the group to get started and SWAT was formed. The name describes what we do, which is

Seek Weeds And Terminate those weeds.

Our main target is banana passion fruit. The pink flowers or orange fruits may be very obvious on a roadside bank or hidden from view tucked away in a gorse gully. One of our aims is to prevent this pest vine from spreading over to the ocean side of the Peninsula by dealing to banana passion fruit vines on Highcliff Road and around Hoopers Inlet. As far as we know banana passion fruit has not been found in the Sandymount Reserve, Boulder Beach or Highcliff areas. Once established, it would be impossible to eradicate from these more remote parts of the Peninsula.

SWAT would like to thank residents who have alerted us to pest plants and all those landowners who have allowed access for the SWAT team on to their properties to tackle the problem vines. It is surprising just how many areas of the Peninsula between Otakou and The Cove we have spent time doing our best to reduce the pest plants. All up 63 different sites!

If you would like advice or help controlling pest plants on your property, or find a plant that you think could be a problem weed we would be keen to hear from you.

The simple things like locking vehicles, getting neighbours to watch over our place if we are away for a while, putting away easily accessible property that may be to the liking of the bad people and generally not giving anyone the opportunity to ruin your day.

To all of our Firearms Licence holders you may or may not be aware that there is now a Firearms Registry which went live on the 23rd of June this year. What this means is that if you're a Licence holder you are now required to provide information about certain arms items you have in your possession. This registry will give Licence holders more confidence when selling or purchasing firearms. The registry will let you know if you are dealing with a current Licence holder and importantly if you're purchasing one **if it is stolen**.

You have until the 24th of June 2028 to get this done but I am encouraging everyone to get it done as soon as able. There are some activating circumstances which require you to do this quicker and they are also online. It is a relatively simple process. Just go to **firearmssafetyauthority.govt.nz** and click on My Firearms. You then follow the prompts to register the arms you have. There is a list of what needs to be registered on the website. If you need any assistance around this, please pop in and I can help. There is no charge for this Registry. Let's do our bit to support this.

Impairment is my focus in relation to Road Policing for the next while. There is no excuse for getting behind the wheel of a motor vehicle if you are impaired. This could be either by alcohol or drugs. If you take that risk and run that gauntlet, then the buck stops with you. Too many lives are lost each year because of impaired drivers, and one should not be so selfish to think they have the right to place other road users at risk because of their actions. Don't be that person.

On a couple of occasions lately I have had reports of dogs rushing out of properties in an aggressive way towards walkers or cyclists passing innocently by. These have been reported to Dog Control at the Council. We know the devastating results that can occur in such instances so please be responsible and take care to ensure something like this cannot happen.

You will have all seen the new 30Kmph signs that have appeared recently in Macandrew Bay, Broad Bay and Portobello. Whether you're are a fan or not (I can hear the voices now), they are there for a reason. Please adhere to them as we should for all advisories on our roads. It is really disappointing to learn that a person on social media is encouraging drivers to ignore the signs except for when they think it is necessary and to text their mates when I am around. This narrow-minded attitude towards road safety beggars belief. There is a simple solution to staying safe and not getting a speeding ticket......I'll let you all work that out.

Please drive safely. Our reported traffic crashes have drastically dropped since the new road has been finished and new speed limits implemented. Let's keep it that way. They say the proof is in the pudding.
